“That’s my shoe.”

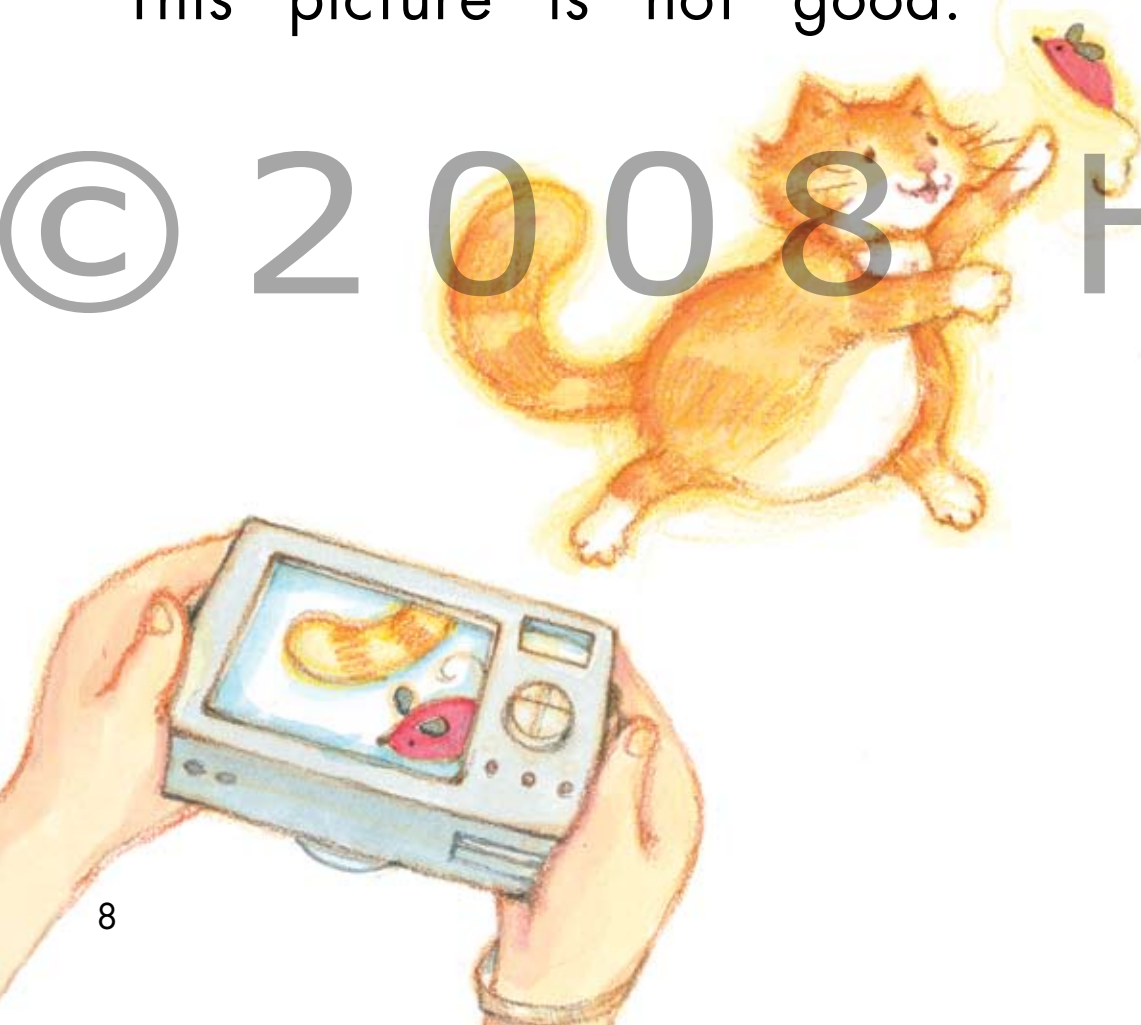
Click!

But that didn't work.

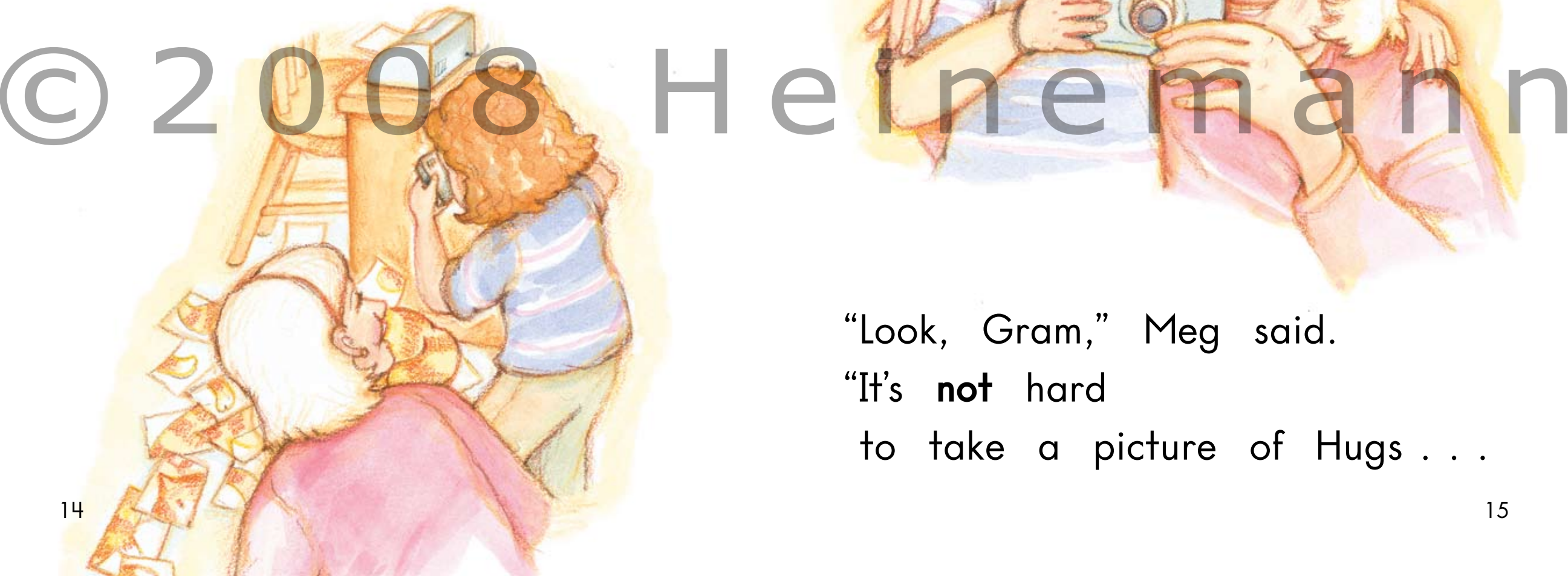
“Do you want me to help?”
